<p>Calaveras is a small rural county in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada Mountains on the east side of the Central Valley. It's one of the smallest and least populous of California's counties.</p> <p>In 2000, the median age was more than 11 years older than the state. It ranked among the top counties for percent of population 65 and older. One of every 5 people was over 65 and one in 56 was over 85. Nearly one in 3 adults was 65+ or disabled.</p>		<p>The unemployment rate was 5.9% (2001). There were projected to be 120 job openings in the region for RNs and an estimated 51 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000).
