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Snapshot	Workforce
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While California's median age was two years younger than the nation in 2000, the 65+ population was growing much faster in California than nationally and the growth in 85+ population was slightly slower. However, within California during the last decade, seniors 85+ grew much faster than both those 65+ and the total population.

Unemployment was 5.3% (2001). At least 11 counties established public authorities for IHSS. There were estimated to be 49,313 job openings for direct care nursing staff in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

In California, one in every 9 people was 65 years of age or older and one in 74 was 85 or older. More than one in every 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.

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In California, one of every 7 persons was Medi-Cal eligible, 14.7% of the population. One in every 53 persons in the state was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price in California was \$236,194 (2001). Statewide average housing vacancy rates in 2000 were: homeowners at 1.4%; rentals at 3.7%.

In California, one in every 5 households had a person 65+ (18.8%) and one in every 13 households had someone 65+ who was living alone (7.8%). Of those over 65, one in 2.9 were living alone (34.7%).

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A number of unique LTC services that are not available statewide are highlighted: LTC Innovation Grants, LTC Integration Pilot Projects or LTC Options, and PACE programs, which capitate Medicare and Medi-Cal LTC services to seniors and others.

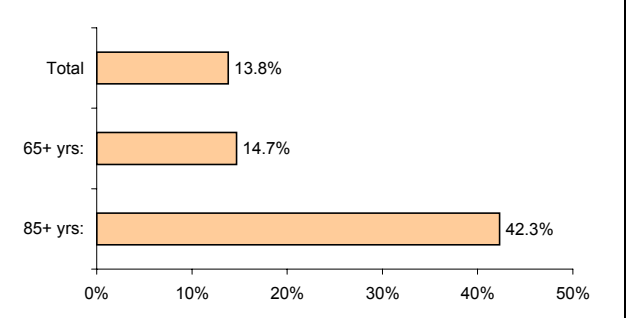

Demographic Trends

California's senior population grew at a faster pace than the general population in the last decade. Seniors 85+ grew much faster (42.3%), and those 65+ (14.7%) slightly faster, than the general population (13.8%).

California is an ethnically diverse state. In 2000, the state had 53% non-Whites. One of every 3 persons was Latino/Hispanic; one in every 9 was Asian; one in every 16 was Black/African American; and one in every 37 was multi-racial. Looking at ethnicity in those 65 and older: one in 13 people in California was 65+/White; one in 69 was 65+/Latino/Hispanic; one in 93 was 65+/Asian; and one in 182 was 65+/Black/African American.
