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Snapshot	Workforce
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Glenn is a small agricultural county in northern Central Valley bordered by the Modocino National Forest and the Sacramento River. It has one of the smallest populations of California's counties.

In 2000, the median age was very close to that of the state of California. More than one of every 8 people was over 65 years of age and one in 56 was over 85. Nearly one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

The unemployment rate was 11.2% (2001), more than double the statewide rate. There were projected to be 8 job openings in the region for RNs and 6 for nursing aides. It was estimated that 35 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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In Glenn County, nearly one in every 6 people was eligible for Medi-Cal.

The median home price was not available (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 for homeowners was close to the state's average at 1.5; rentals were higher at 8.2%.

Glenn county had more households with individuals 65+ (24.6%) and 65+ living alone (10.7%) than California on average. Of those 65 and older, one in 2.5 were living alone (39.8%).

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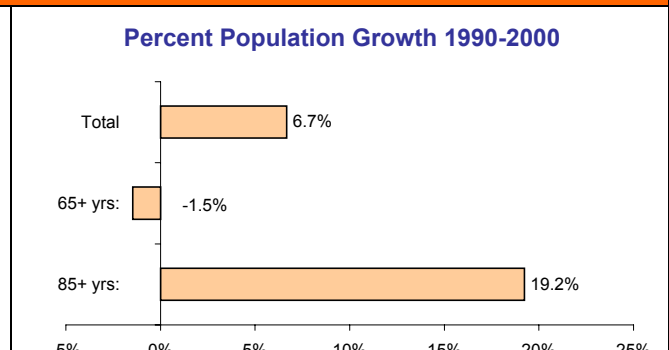
LTC Innovation Grant: COIL InfoVan for outreach through AAA.

Demographic Trends

Glenn County's population has grown at a slower pace than California in the last decade. There was growth in those 85 and older, but a decline in those 65 and older.

In 2000, Glenn had 37% non-Whites and the state had 53% non-Whites. Nearly one of every 3 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 30 was Asian; one in 59 was American Indian/Alaska Native; and one in every 48 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 8 people was 65+/White and one in 101 was Hispanic/Latino.

The median household income was \$15,400 less than California's, with many more people living below the poverty level--nearly one in 4.
