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<b>Snapshot</b>	<b>Workforce</b>
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Inyo is one of the largest counties, centrally located on the eastern side of California bordering Nevada. Most of the land is publically owned and it is home to both Mt. Whitney and Death Valley.

In 2000, the median age was 9.5 years older than California. One of every 5 people was 65+ and one in 40 was 85+. Nearly one in every 3 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was 4.9% (2001). There were projected to be 30 job openings for RNs, and an estimated 38 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

<b>Medi-Cal</b>	<b>Housing</b>
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In Inyo County the number of Medi-Cal eligibles was close to California's average--one in every 7 people.

The median home price was not available. Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than statewide averages: homeowners at 1.8%; rentals at 6.9%.

Inyo had significantly more households with individuals 65+ (29.3%) and 65+ living alone (13.6%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.3 were living alone (43.1%).

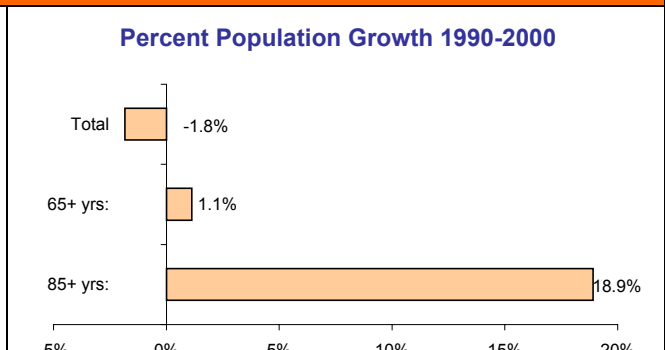

**Demographic Trends**

Inyo County's total population declined in the last decade. There was a much slower growth than California in those 65+ and 85+.

In 2000, Inyo had 25% non-Whites while the state had 53% non-Whites. One of every 8 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 11 was American Indian/Alaska Native; and one in 41 was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in every 6 was 65+/White and one in 139 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino.

The median household income was \$12,500 less than California's; however, fewer people were living below the poverty level--one in 8.
