Lake is a rural county several hours north of San Francisco, named for its many lakes, including the largest freshwater lake in California, Clear Lake.

In 2000, the median age was more than 9 years older than California. One of every 5 people was over 65 years of age and one in 43 was over 85. More than one of every 3 adults was 65+ or disabled.

The unemployment rate was 7.3% (2001). There were projected to be 101 job openings in the region for RNs and 74 for nursing aides. An estimate 178 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Lake County had a high percent of Medi-Cal eligibles (2000)--one in every 5 people.

Lake ranked third highest of all counties with seniors 65+ on Medi-Cal--one of every 36 people in the county.

The median home price was not available (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than statewide averages: homeowners at 4.2%; rentals at 10.3%.

Lake had significantly more households with individuals 65+ (31.2%) and 65+ living alone (13.4%) than California on average. Of those 65 and older, one in 2.9 were living alone (34.7%).

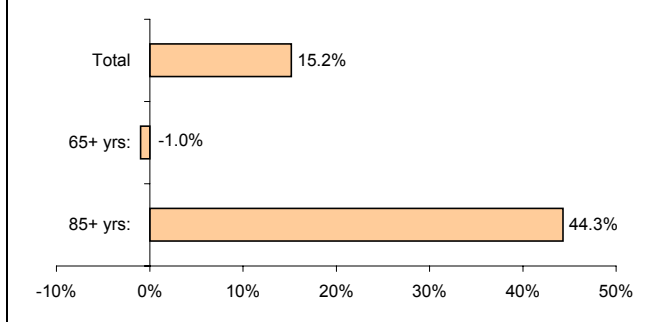

Lake County's population has grown at a slightly faster pace than California in the last decade. The growth in those 85+ was slightly higher, but there was a decline in those 65+.

In 2000, Lake had 19% non-Whites and the state had 53% non-Whites. One of every 9 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in every 38 persons was multi-racial; one in 42 was American Indian/Alaska Native; and one in 48 was Black/African American. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 5 persons was 65+/White; one in 143 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 169 was 65+/Black/African American.

~ High median age--many seniors 85+ but fewer seniors 65+.	~ IHSS and adult day services were available, as well as NFs and home health, but few RCFEs.
~ Median income was low and housing readily available.
