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Snapshot	Workforce
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Marin lies along the Pacific Ocean across the Golden Gate Bridge above San Francisco, a county that includes tidelands and Mt. Tamalpais.

In 2000, the median age was 8 years older than California. One of every 7 people was 65 years or older, and one in 50 was 85 or older. More than one in 5 people was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was low at 2.5% (2001), less than half the state's rate. There were projected to be 187 job openings for RNs and 187 for nurse aides. An estimated 470 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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Marin County ranked lowest in percent of Medi-Cal eligibles--one in every 23 people. One in every 125 persons in the county was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price was \$533,646 (2001), the highest in California. Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower than statewide: homeowners at 0.7% and rentals at 2.2%.

Marin had more households with individuals 65+ (21.5%) and with those 65+ living alone (9.6%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.5 was living alone (40.7%).

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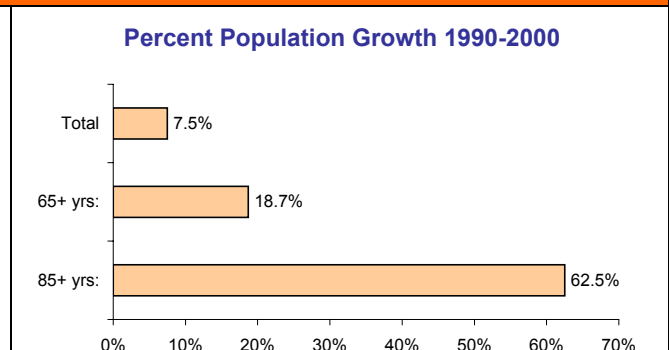
LTC Innovation Grants: Project Independence assisting seniors to return home; COIL InfoVan through Area Agency on Aging.

Reported transit services for people in the cities and county of Marin: 64,631 passengers using special vehicles; 29 special vehicles operated peak hours and 22 operated middays during the week; 7 on Saturdays; and 7 on Sundays.

Demographic Trends

Marin County's population grew at a slower pace than California's in the last decade. However, there was a faster rate of growth than the state's in those 65+ and those 85+.

In 2000, Marin had 21% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 10 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 22 was Asian; one in 36 was Black/African American; and one in 42 was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 8 was 65+/White; one in 227 was 65+/Asian; and one in 256 was 65+/Black/African American.

The median household income was more than \$21,000 higher than California's with people living below the poverty level was less than one in 15.

~ More than one in 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.	~ Few seniors, and others, were receiving Medi-Cal, Medicare and SSI/SSP.
~ High median age; many 85+ and percent was growing rapidly.	~ Few younger adults were disabled.
~ Second highest income and lowest unemployment rate.	~ Housing was expensive and not readily available.
~ Few people were living in poverty, including seniors.	~ NFs and RCFEs were more available than adult day services and home health, with few RCFEs.
