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Snapshot	Workforce
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Modoc is a county of mountain ranges, valleys and forests in the far northeastern corner of California bordering Oregon and Nevada.

In 2000, the median age was 8.5 years older than California. More than one of every 6 people was over 65 years of age and one in 53 was over 85. One in 3 adults was 65+ or disabled.

The unemployment rate was 7.0% (2001). There were projected to be 60 job openings in the region for RNs. Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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Modoc ranked among counties with a high percent of Medi-Cal eligibles (2000)--more than one in every 6 people. One of every 45 people was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price was not available (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than the state's average: homeowners at 5.1%; rentals at 9.3%.

Modoc had more households with individuals 65+ (28.8%) and 65+ living alone (12.7%) than California. Of those 65+, one in 2.4 was living alone (41.0%).

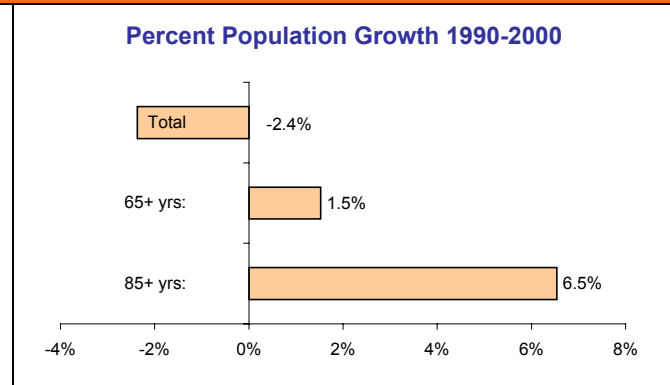

Demographic Trends

Modoc County's population was less in 2000 than a decade ago. However, there was a slight growth in those 65+ and 85+.

In 2000, Modoc had 19% non-Whites and the state had 53% non-Whites. One of every 9 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 28 was American Indian/Alaska Native; and one in 45 was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 6 persons was 65+/White; one in 192 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 233 was 65+/American Indian/Alaska Native.

The median household income was nearly \$20,000 less than California's, with many more people living below the poverty level--more than one in 5, including many seniors.
