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Snapshot	Workforce
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Mono is a rural county, sparsely populated, which is centrally located on the eastern slopes of the Sierra Nevada Mountains bordering Nevada. It is home to Mono Lake and Mammoth Mountain.

In 2000, the median age was more than 3 years younger than California. Nearly one of every 13 people was 65+; however, only one in 200 was 85 or older. More than one in 6 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was at 5.2% (2001). There were an estimated 30 job openings for RNs. Average hourly wages (2001):

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Mono ranked among those counties with a low percent of Medi-Cal eligibles--less than one in every 16 people. One in every 200 persons in the county was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price was \$129,071 (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than statewide averages: homeowners at 2.1% and rentals at 20.9%.

Mono had fewer households with individuals 65+ (12.6%) and with those 65+ living alone (4.3%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 3.2 was living alone (30.8%).

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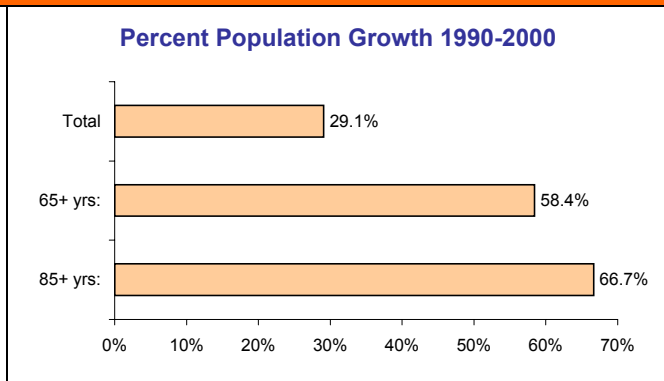

Demographic Trends

Mono County's population grew more than twice as fast as California's in the last decade. Mono had nearly four times the state's growth rate in seniors 65+ and a faster growth in those 85+.

In 2000, Mono had 23% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. Nearly one of every 6 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 48 was African American; one in 67 was multi-racial; and one in 91 was Asian. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 14 persons was 65+/White and one in 323 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino.

The median household income was \$2,500 less than California's, with fewer people living below the poverty level--one in 9.
