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Snapshot	Workforce
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Napa County lies northeast of San Francisco in the rolling hills of the Napa Valley, known for its vineyards and wines.

In 2000, the median age was 5 years older than California. One of every 6 people was 65 years or older, and one in 40 was 85 or older. One in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was at 3.3% (2001). There were projected to be 190 jobs for RNs in the region and an estimated 370 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

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Napa ranked among those counties with a low percent of Medi-Cal eligibles--one in every 15 people. One in every 91 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

Napa is one of 8 counties with a County Organized Health System (COHS)--Partnership HealthPlan of California--serving 90% of the Medi-Cal recipients, including those in NFs.

The median home price was \$299,621 (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower than statewide averages: homeowners at 1.3% and rentals at 2.8%.

Napa had more households with individuals 65+ (25.4%) and with those 65+ living alone (11.6%) than California. Of those 65+, one in 2.5 was living alone (41.7%).

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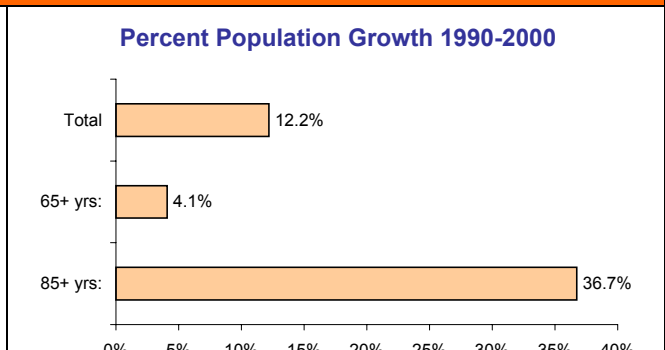

Demographic Trends

Napa County's population grew at a slower pace than California's in the last decade. There was also a slower rate of growth than the state's in those 65+ and those 85+.

In 2000, Napa had 31% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 4 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 35 was Asian; one in 48 was multi-racial; and one in 83 was Black/African American. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 7 persons was 65+/White; one in 125 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 286 was 65+/Black/African American.

The median household income was \$4,200 higher than California's, with fewer people living below the poverty level--one in 12.

~ One in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.	~ Few seniors or others, were living in poverty or on Medi-Cal, Medicare and SSI/SSP.
~ Second highest percent of 85+; growth slow compared to most counties.	~ Housing was not readily available, especially rentals.
~ Many seniors 65+ were living alone.	~ RCFEs and NFs were more available than adult day services and home health, with few IHSS providers.
~ Many seniors 65+ but only a slight growth in those 65+.
