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Snapshot	Workforce
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Nevada County is located in the heart of the gold country and stretches from the foothills above the Sacramento Valley across the Sierra Nevada Mountains to the state of Nevada.

In 2000, the median age was nearly 10 years older than California. More than one of every 6 people was 65+ years of age, and one in 48 was 85 or older. More than one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was at 3.7% (2001). There were projected to be 69 job openings for RNs and 42 for nurse aides. An estimated 198 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities(2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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Nevada ranked among those counties with a low percent of Medi-Cal eligibles--one in every 16 people. One in every 100 persons in the county was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price was \$245,333 (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower than statewide averages: homeowners at 1.3% and rentals at 3.1%.

Nevada had more households with individuals 65+ (27.3%) and with those 65+ living alone (9.8%) than California. Of those 65+, one in 3.0 was living alone (32.9%).

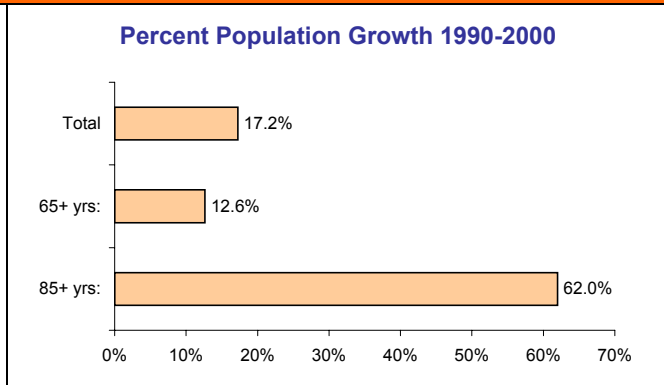

Demographic Trends

Nevada County's population grew faster than California's in the last decade. The growth in those 65+ was slower, but the growth was faster than the state's for those 85+.

In 2000, Nevada had 10% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. More than one of every 18 persons was Hispanic/Latino and one in 48 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 6 persons was 65+/White and one in 303 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino.

The median household income was \$1,600 less than California's, with fewer people living below the poverty level--one in 12.
