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**Snapshot**

Orange is the second most populous county in California, covering 42 miles of coastland along the Pacific Ocean between Los Angeles and San Diego.

In 2000, the median age was the same as California. One of every 10 people was 65 years or older, and one in 77 was 85 or older. One in 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.

**Workforce**

Unemployment was 3.0% (2001). There were an estimated 3,308 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

**Medi-Cal**

In Orange County one in every 11 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 71 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

Orange is one of 8 counties with a County Organized Health System (COHS)--CalOPTIMA--serving 85% of the county's Medi-Cal recipients, including those in NFs.

**Housing**

The median home price was \$283,333 (2001). Compared to California, housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower for homeowners at 0.9% and for rentals at 3.0%.

Orange had fewer households with individuals 65+ (17.7%) but more with those 65+ living alone (7.2%) than California. Of those 65+, one in 3.0 was living alone (33.7%).

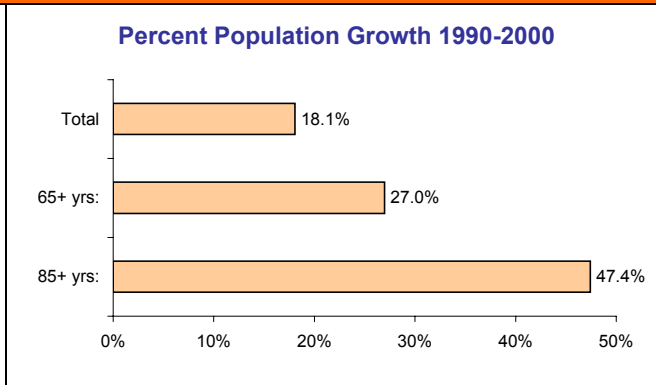
**Transportation**

**Demographic Trends**

In the last decade, Orange County's population grew at a faster pace than California. There was also a faster growth in those 65+ and those 85+.

In 2000, Orange had 49% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 3 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 7 was Asian; and one in every 43 was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 13 persons was 65+/White; one in 93 was 65+/ Asian; and one in 97 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino.
