**Snapshot**

Riverside is a large Southern California county in both population and geographic size and extends to the Nevada border.

In 2000, the median age was the similar to California. One of every 8 people was 65 years or older, and one in 67 was 85 or older. Nearly one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

**Workforce**

Unemployment was 5.2% (2001). There were an estimated 1,937 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

**Medi-Cal**

In Riverside County one in every 8 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 77 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

Riverside is one of 12 counties that provide Medi-Cal managed care services through the Two-Plan model, offering choice between two managed care plans for families with children and others.

**Housing**

The median home price was \$165,525 (2001). Compared to California, housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher for homeowners at 2.5% and for rentals at 7.2%.

Riverside had more households with individuals 65+ (23.7.2%) but more with those 65+ living alone (9.3%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.9 was living alone (34.5%).

**Long Term Care: Special Programs**

LTC Innovation Grants: COIL InfoVan for outreach through AAA; Partnership for Integrated Data Management.

LTCIPP: State grant funds from DHS received to plana system which coordinates and integrates services to seniors and those with disabilities.

**Transportation**

Reported transit services for people in the cities and county of Riverside: 575,237 passengers using special vehicles; 78 special vehicles operated peak hours and 87 middays during the week; and 36 on Saturdays and 36 on Sundays (FY 99-00).

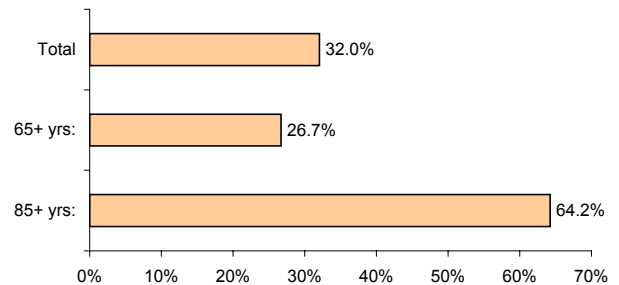

**Demographic Trends**

In the last decade, Riverside County's total population grew at a much faster pace than California, as did those 65+, and those 85+.

In 2000, Riverside had 49% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 3 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 17 was Black/African American; one in 28 was Asian; and one in 45 was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 9 persons was 65+/White; one in 65 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 238 was 65+/Asian.

The median household income was \$4,600 less than California's, with the same number of people living below the poverty level—one in 7.
