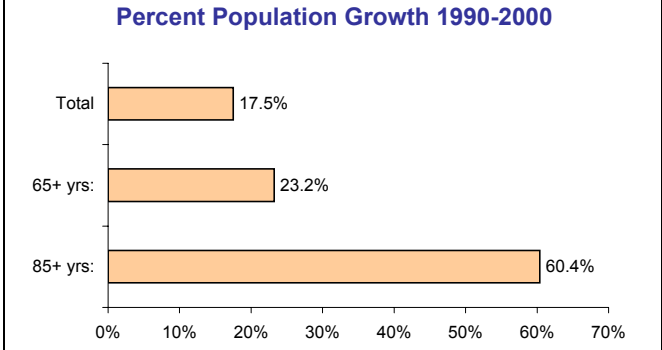

<p>Sacramento County is home to California's state capitol, lying along the American River and the Sacramento River in the Central Valley between San Francisco and Lake Tahoe.</p> <p>In 2000, the median age was similar to California. One of every 11 people was 65 years or older, and one in 74 was 85 or older. Nearly one of 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.</p>			<p>Unemployment was at 4.1% (2001). There were projected to be 1,353 job openings for RNs and an estimated 1,502 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). The county has a public authority for IHSS. <p>In Sacramento, one in every 5 people was Medi-Cal eligible. One in every 56 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.</p> <p>Sacramento is one of two counties in California providing Medi-Cal managed care services through the Geographic Managed Care (GMC) model, contracting with managed care plans for families with children and others.</p>			<p>The median home price was \$169,292 (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were close to statewide averages: homeowners at 1.5% and rentals at 4.8%.</p> <p>Sacramento had about the same percent of households with individuals 65+ (18.6%) and with those 65+ living alone (8.0%) as California. Of those 65+, one in 2.7 was living alone (37.4%).</p>

Demographic Trends

In the last decade, Sacramento County's population grew at a faster pace than California, including those 65+ and 85+.

In 2000, Sacramento had 42% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 6 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 9 was Asian; one in 10 was Black/African American; and one in 24 was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 11 persons was 65+/White; one in 91 was 65+/Asian; one in 132 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 149 was 65+/Black/African American.

The median household income was \$3,700 less than California's, with about the same number of people living below the poverty level--one in 7.
