

Snapshot	Workforce
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San Bernardino is the largest county in geographic size in California, extending to the Nevada border in Southern California, and home to Death Valley.

In 2000, the median age was 3 years younger than California. One of every 11 people was 65 years or older, and one in 100 was 85 or older. One in 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was 4.8% (2001). There were an estimated 2,530 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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In San Bernardino County one in every 6 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 71 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

San Bernardino is one of 12 counties that provide Medi-Cal managed care services through the Two-Plan model, offering choice between two health plans for families with children and others.

The median home price was \$134,833 (2001). Compared to California, housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher for homeowners at 3.1% and for rentals at 7.3%.

San Bernardino had fewer households with individuals 65+ (16.6%) and those 65+ living alone (6.6%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 3.0 was living alone (32.8%).

Long Term Care: Special Programs	Transportation
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LTC Innovation Grant: 3 COIL InfoVans provide outreach through AAA; Montclair Thriving Aging program for Hispanic and other underserved older adults.

LTCIPP: State grant funds from DHS received to plan a system which coordinates and integrates services to seniors and those with disabilities.

Reported transit services for people in the cities and county of San Bernardino: 935,503 passengers using special vehicles; 124 special vehicles operated peak hours and 93 middays during the week; and 39 on Saturdays and 17 on Sundays (FY 99-00).

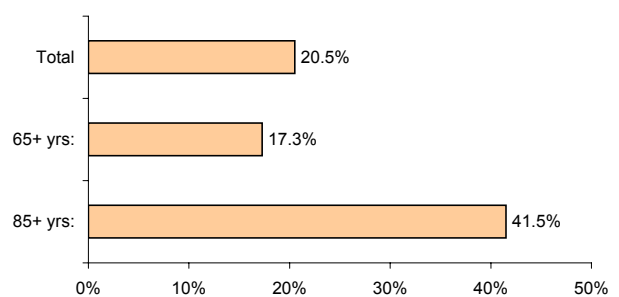

Demographic Trends

In the last decade, San Bernardino County's total population grew at a faster pace than California, as did those 65+, but the growth of those 85+ was similar to California.

In 2000, San Bernardino had 56% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 3 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 22 was Asian; one in 11 was Black/African American; and one in every 40 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 16 persons was 65+/White; one in 62 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 213 was 65+/Black/African American.

The median household income was \$5,400 less than California's with more people living below the poverty level--one in 6.
