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Snapshot	Workforce
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San Diego is the third most populous county in California, stretching along the Pacific Ocean in Southern California to the Mexico border.

In 2000, the median age was the similar to California. One of every 9 people was 65 years or older, and one in 71 was 85 or older.

Unemployment was 3.2% (2001). There were an estimated 3,982 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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In San Diego County one in every 10 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 67 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

San Diego is one of two counties operating a Medi-Cal Geographic Managed Care (GMC) model, offering choice through many health plans for families with children and others.

The median home price was \$250,062 (2001). Compared to California, housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower for homeowners at 1.0% and for rentals at 3.1%.

San Diego had more households with individuals 65+ (19.2%) but more with those 65+ living alone (7.9%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.8 was living alone (35.3%).

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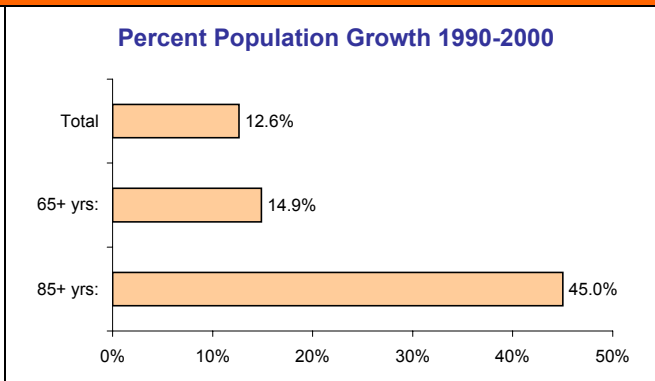

Demographic Trends

In the last decade, San Diego's population grew at a slower pace than California. The county grew at the same pace as the state for those 65+, but slightly faster for those 85+.

In 2000, San Diego had 45% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 4 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 12 was Asian; one in 18 was Black/African American; and one in every 40 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 11 persons was 65+/White; one in 79 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 127 was 65+/Asian.

The median household income was about \$400 less than California's with fewer people living below the poverty level--one in 8.
