

Snapshot

San Francisco County is a city on the hills by the San Francisco Bay in Northern California, home to the Golden Gate Bridge.

In 2000, the median age was 3+ years older than California. One of every 7 was 65 years or older, and one in 50 was 85 or older. More than one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Workforce

Unemployment was 5.2% (2001). There were an estimated 476 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). County has Public Authority for IHSS. Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal

In San Francisco County one in every 7 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 23 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

San Francisco is one of 12 counties that provide Medi-Cal managed care through the Two-Plan model, offering choice between two managed care plans for families with children and others.

Housing

The median home price was \$516,271 (2001). Compared to California, housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower for both homeowners at 0.8% and for rentals at 2.5%.

San Francisco had more households with individuals 65+ (20.0%) and those 65+ living alone (9.8%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.4 was living alone (41.0%).

LTC Innovation Grants: SF GetCare Web Information System; COIL InfoVan provides outreach through AAA.

LTCIPP: State grant funds from DHS received to plan a system which coordinates and integrates services to seniors and those with disabilities.

PACE: On-Lok Senior Health Services; Goldman Institute

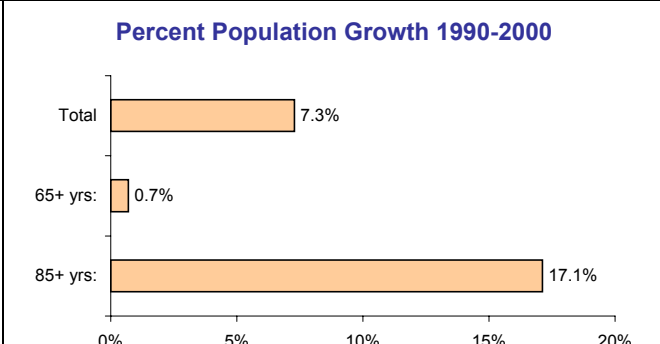
Transportation

Demographic Trends

In the last decade, San Francisco County's total population grew at a much slower pace than California, as did those 85+; there was almost no growth in those 65+.

In 2000, San Francisco had 56% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 3 persons was Asian; one in 7 was Hispanic/Latino; one in 13 was Black/African American; and one in every 33 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 16 persons was 65+/White; one in 19 was 65+/Asian; one in 82 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 88 was 65+/Black/African American.

The median household income was nearly \$7,700 more than California's, with fewer people living below the poverty level--one in 9.
