San Joaquin is a rich, fertile agricultural county below Sacramento in California's Central Valley.

In 2000, the median age was younger than the state of California by about 1.5 years. One of every 9 people was over 65 years of age and one in 71 was 85 or older. Nearly one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was at 8.7% (2001), higher than the statewide rate. There were an estimated 1,059 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

In San Joaquin, one in every 6 persons was Medi-Cal eligible. One of every 53 persons in the county was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

San Joaquin is one of 12 counties that provide Medi-Cal managed care through the Two-Plan Model, offering choice between two managed care plans for families with children and others.

The median home price was \$169,599 (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were near statewide averages: homeowners at 1.2%; rentals at 3.8%.

San Joaquin had more individuals 65+ (20.0%) and 65+ living alone (8.4%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.8 were living alone (36.1%).

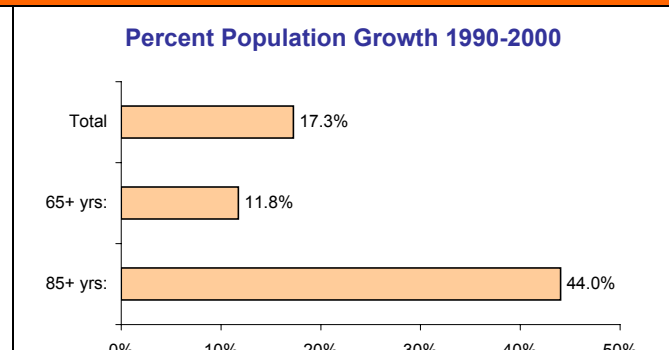

**Demographic Trends**

San Joaquin County's population is growing faster than California. However, the growth in the percent of those who are over 65 is less and those over 85 only slightly higher.

In 2000, San Joaquin had 53% non-Whites, identical to California's statewide average of 53% non-Whites. One of every 3 persons was Hispanic/Hispanic; one in 9 was Asian; one in 16 was Black/African American; and one in every 29 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in every 13 persons was 65+/White; one in 69 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 92 was 65+/Asian.

The median household income was \$6,200 lower than California's, with more people living below the poverty level--more than one in 6.
