

<b>Snapshot</b>	<b>Workforce</b>
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Santa Barbara County has more than 100 miles of Pacific coastline along the south central coast of California, several hours north of Los Angeles.

In 2000, the median age was like that of California. One of every 8 people was 65 years or older, and one in 56 was 85 or older. Nearly one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was low at 3.5% (2001). There were projected to be 210 openings for RNs and an estimated 451 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

<b>Medi-Cal</b>	<b>Housing</b>
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In Santa Barbara one in every 9 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 83 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

Santa Barbara is one of 8 counties with a County Organized Health System (COHS)--Health Plan of Santa Barbara--which serves 85% of the county's Medi-Cal recipients, including those in NFs.

The median home price was \$217,639 (2001). Compared to California, housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower for both homeowners at 0.8% and rentals at 2.8%.

Santa Barbara had more households with individuals 65+ (23.0%) and 65+ living alone (9.4%) than California. Of those 65+, one in 2.7 was living alone (36.6%).

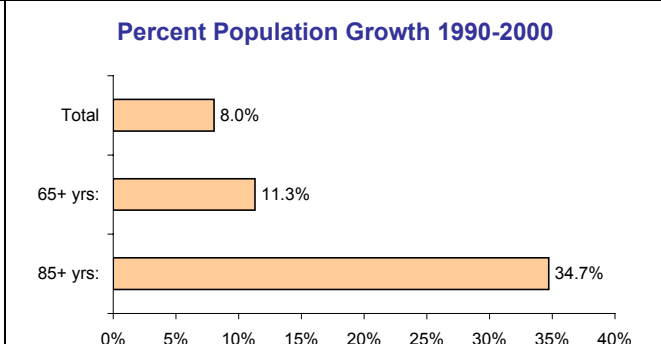

**Demographic Trends**

In the last decade, Santa Barbara County's population grew at a slower pace than California, as well as for those 65+ and those 85+.

In 2000, Santa Barbara had 43% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 3 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 26 was Asian; one in 53 was Black/African American; and one in every 45 was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 9 persons was 65+/White; one in 63 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 250 was 65+/Asian.

The median household income was \$800 less than California's, with about the same percent of people living below the poverty level--one in 7.
