Santa Clara County is located south of San Francisco in a valley between mountain ranges and is home to the high-tech Silicon Valley.

In 2000, the median age was less than a year older than California. One of every 10 people was 65 years or older, and one in 91 was 85 or older. One in 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was 4.5% (2001). There were an estimated 2,192 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). County has IHSS Public Authority. Average hourly wages (2001):

In Santa Clara one in every 13 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 53 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

Santa Clara is one of 12 counties providing Medi-Cal managed care through the Two-Plan model, offering choice for families with children and others.

The median home price was \$457,295 (2001). Compared to California, housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower for both homeowners at 0.5% and rentals at 1.8%.

Santa Clara had fewer households with individuals 65+ (15.8%) and with those 65+ living alone (5.9%) than California. Of those 65+, one in 3.4 was living alone (29.5%).

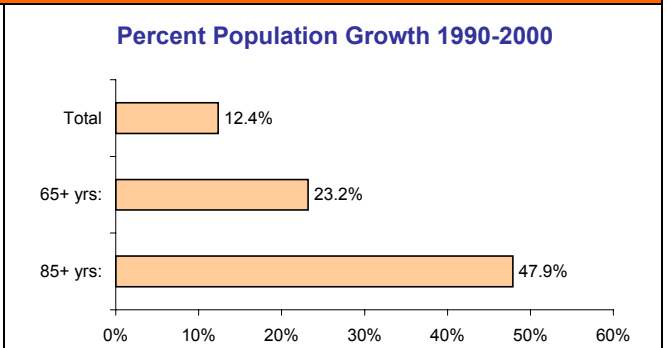
LTC Innovation Grants: Partnership for Integrated Data Management; COIL InfoVan for outreach through AAA.

Demographic Trends

In the last decade, Santa Clara County's population grew at a pace slightly slower than California; however, there was faster growth in those 65+ and those 85+.

In 2000, Santa Clara had 56% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 4 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 4 was Asian; one in 38 was Black/African American; and one in every 33 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 16 persons was 65+/White; one in 86 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 52 was 65+/Asian.
