

Snapshot	Workforce
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Shasta County is located in Northern California, home to Mt. Shasta, Lake Shasta, state parks, national forests, mountains, and farmlands.

In 2000, the median age was about 5.5 years older than California. More than one of every 6 people was 65+ years of age, and one in 53 was 85 or older. More than one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was at 6.7% (2001). There were projected to be 162 job openings for RNs and 172 for nursing aides. An estimated 321 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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In Shasta County one in every 6 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 56 persons in the county was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price was not available (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than statewide averages: homeowners at 2.2% and rentals at 5.9%.

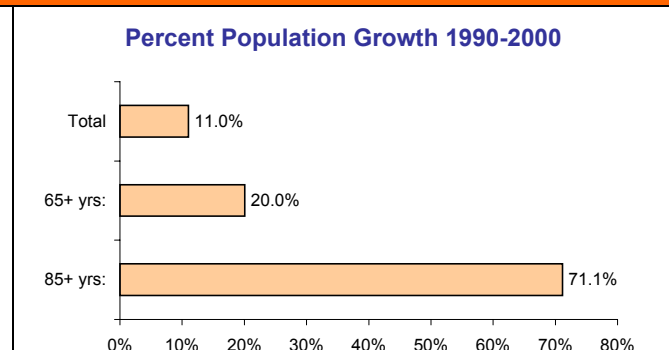
Shasta had more households with individuals 65+ (25.0%) and with those 65+ living alone (10.3%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.7 was living alone (37.5%).

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Reported transit services for people in the cities and county of Shasta: 86,611 passengers using special vehicles; 22 special vehicles operated peak hours and 21 operated middays during the week; and 6 on Saturdays and none on Sundays.

Demographic Trends

In the last decade, Shasta County's population grew slower than California; however, the percent of those 65+ and 85+ grew faster than the state.

In 2000, Shasta had 14% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 18 persons in the county was Hispanic/Latino; one in every 40 persons was American Indian/Alaska Native; one in 53 was Asian; and one in every 36 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 7 persons was 65+/White; one in 345 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 435 was 65+/multi-racial.

The median household income was \$13,200 less than California's with more people living below the poverty level--nearly one in 6.
