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Snapshot	Workforce
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Solano County lies northeast of San Francisco and is a rich agricultural land of rolling hills stretching toward Sacramento near the Napa Valley.

In 2000, the median age was similar to California. One of every 10 people was 65 years or older, and one in 91 was 85 or older. One in 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was at 4.1% (2001). There were projected to be 547 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

Medi-Cal	Housing
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In Solano, one in every 10 people was Medi-Cal eligible. One in every 71 persons in the county was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

Solano is one of 8 counties with a County Organized Health System (COHS)--Partnership HealthPlan of California--which serves 96% of the Medi-Cal recipients, including those in NFs.

The median home price was \$219,062 (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower than statewide averages: homeowners at 0.9% and rentals at 3.7%.

Solano had fewer households with individuals 65+ (16.7%) and with those 65+ living alone (6.5%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 3.1 was living alone (32.3%).

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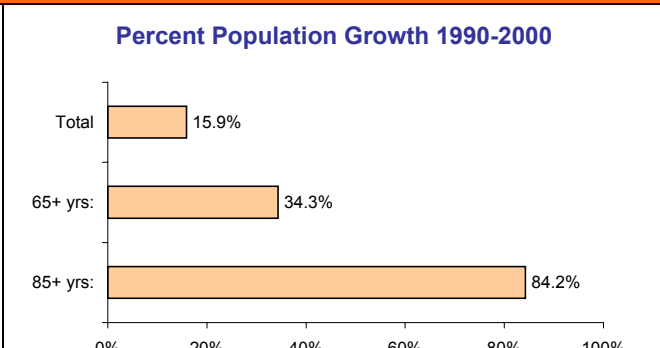

Demographic Trends

In the last decade, Solano County's population grew at a faster pace than California, especially for those 65+ and 85+.

In 2000, Solano had 51% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 6 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 7 was Black/African American; one in 8 was Asian; and one in 22 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 16 persons was 65+/White; one in 76 was 65+/Asian; one in 101 was 65+/Black/African American; and one in 133 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino.

The median household income was \$6,600 higher than California's, with fewer people living below the poverty level--one in 12.
