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<b>Snapshot</b>	<b>Workforce</b>
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Tehama is a county of open space, ranches and farms north of the Sacramento Valley, surrounded by the snow-covered mountains of Shasta, Lassen and Trinity Mountains.

In 2000, the median age was 4.5 years older than California. One of every 6 people was over 65 years of age and one in 53 was over 85. More than one in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.

The unemployment rate was 6.8% (2001). There were projected to be 60 job openings in the region for RNs and an estimated 42 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

<b>Medi-Cal</b>	<b>Housing</b>
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Tehama had one in nearly 5 people eligible for Medi-Cal. One of every 43 persons was 65+ and on Medi-Cal.

The median home price was not available (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than statewide averages: homeowners at 4.1%; rentals at 13.4%.

The county had more households with individuals 65+ (20.8%) and 65+ living alone (9.2%) than California. Of those 65 and older, one in 2.5 were living alone (40.5%).

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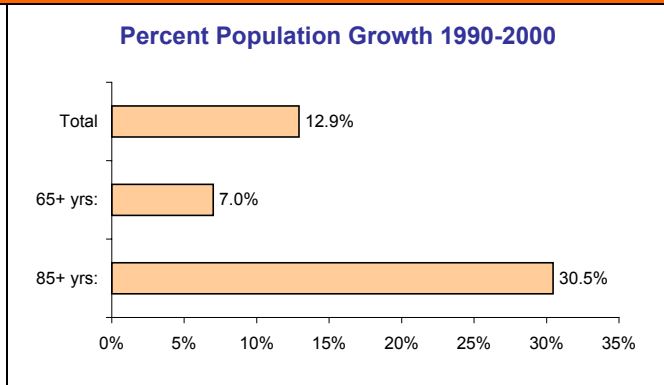

**Demographic Trends**

Tehama County's population has grown at a slightly slower pace than California in the last decade. The growth in those 65+ and 85+ was also slower.

In 2000, Tehama had 11% non-Whites and the state had 53% non-Whites. More than one of every 6 persons in the county was Latino/Hispanic; one in 56 was American Indian/Alaska Native; and one in every 42 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 7 was 65+/White; and one in 161 was 65+/Latino/Hispanic.

The median household income was \$16,300 less than California's, with more people living below the poverty level--more than one in 6.
