Toulumne is a county of forests and high mountain passes on the western slopes of the central Sierra Nevada Mountains near Yosemite.

In 2000, the median age was nearly 10 years older than California. Nearly one of every 5 people was 65+ years of age, and one in 53 was 85 or older. Nearly one in 3 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was at 5.5% (2001). There were projected to be 120 job openings for RNs. Average hourly wages (2001):

In Toulumne County one in every 9 people was eligible for Medi-Cal. One in every 71 persons in the county was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price was not available (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than statewide averages: homeowners at 2.2% and rentals at 6.9%.

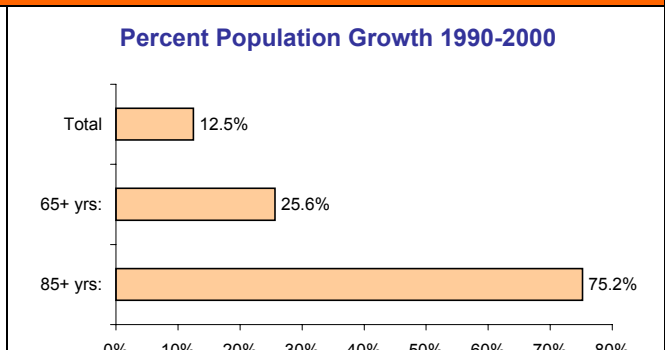
Toulumne had more households with individuals 65+ (30.8%) and with those 65+ living alone (11.7%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.8 was living alone (35.6%).

Demographic Trends

During the last decade, Toulumne County's population grew at a pace similar to California; however, there was a much faster pace of growth of those 65+ and 85+.

In 2000, Toulumne had 15% non-Whites, while California had 53% non-Whites. One of every 12 persons in the county was Latino/Hispanic; one in 48 was Black/African American; one in every 63 persons was American Indian/Alaska Native; and one in every 45 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in every 6 persons was 65+/White; one in 172 was 65+/Latino/Hispanic.

The median household income was \$8,800 less than California's, with fewer people living below the poverty level--one in 9.
