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<b>Snapshot</b>	<b>Workforce</b>
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Yolo is an agricultural county located close to both Sacramento and the San Francisco Bay Area in Northern California, home to the University of California at Davis.

In 2000, the median age was younger than the state of California by nearly 4 years. One of every 10 people was over 65 years of age and one in 80 was 85 or older. Nearly one in 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.

Unemployment was 4.2% (2001). There were projected to be 314 direct care nursing staff needed in facilities (2000). The county has a public authority for IHSS. Average hourly wages (2001):

<b>Medi-Cal</b>	<b>Housing</b>
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In Yolo County one in every 8 persons was Medi-Cal eligible. One of every 63 persons in the county was 65+ and a Medi-Cal recipient.

The median home price was \$200,556 (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were lower than California statewide averages: homeowners at 0.9%; rentals at 3.4%.

Yolo had fewer individuals 65+ (16.8%) and 65+ living alone (7.3%) than California. Of those over 65, one in 2.6 were living alone (38.9%).

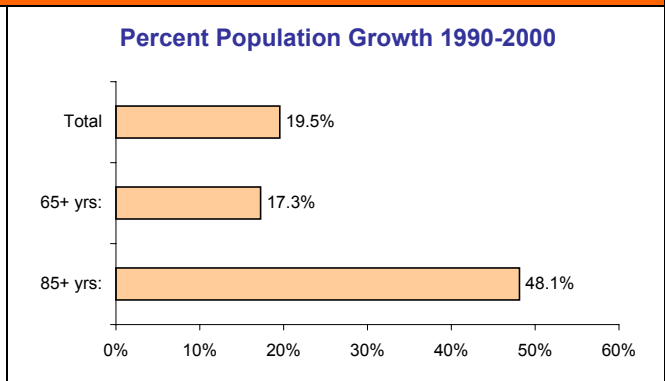
LTCIPP: State grant funds from DHS were received for planning how to coordinate and integrate services for seniors and those with disabilities.

**Demographic Trends**

In the last decade, Yolo County's population grew faster than California, including those 65+ and 85+.

In 2000, Yolo had 42% non-Whites, compared to California's statewide average of 53% non-Whites. One of every 4 persons in the county was Latino/Hispanic; one in every 10 was Asian; one in 54 was Black/African American; and one in every 31 persons was multi-racial. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in every 13 persons was 65+/White; one in 81 was 65+/Hispanic/Latino; and one in 250 was 65+/Asian.

The median household income was \$6,700 less more than California's, with nearly one in 6 people living below the poverty level, including many seniors.

### Emerging Long Term Care Issues

- ~ Nearly one in 5 adults was 65+ or disabled.
- ~ Had second highest percentage in state of seniors 65+ living in poverty.
- ~ Median age was among youngest in state with few seniors 85+.
- ~ Few adults were disabled and few seniors 65+ were living alone.
- ~ Unemployment was low and housing not readily available.
- ~ NFs and RCFEs were more available than adult day services and IHSS, with few home health services.
